Government Entry / Exit Requirements	<p>The authorities have enhanced screening at major international airports. Major airlines have cancelled or reduced flights to China, Iran, Italy, Japan and South Korea. US nationals who have travelled to China's Hubei province in the past 14 days are subject to a mandatory 14-day quarantine, while foreign nationals who have been to China and Iran in the 14 days prior to arrival will be barred entry, with certain exceptions.</p> <p>Starting 13 March, entry will be suspended for 30 days for non-US nationals who have been in the Schengen Area of Europe at any time in the past 14 days prior to their arrival to the US. Affected countries are: Austria, Belgium, Czech Republic, Denmark, Estonia, Finland, France, Germany, Greece, Hungary, Iceland, Italy, Latvia, Liechtenstein, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Malta, the Netherlands, Norway, Poland, Portugal, Slovakia, Slovenia, Spain, Sweden and Switzerland. US nationals will be allowed to return after 'appropriate screening'; permanent residents will also be allowed to return, as will immediate family members of US citizens.</p> <p>As of 16 March 2020 travel ban extends to UK and Ireland.</p> <p>the suspension of entry does not apply to any lawful permanent resident of the United States, close family members (spouses, siblings, parents and guardians) of a U.S. citizen or lawful permanent resident or air crew.</p> <p>There are limited other exceptions, primarily related to official US government business and members of the US armed forces. As a consequence of the exemption for air crew, this measure does not apply to cargo carriers.</p>	14.3.2020	International SOS security alert

Airline Requirements	<p>CDC Order requiring airlines to collect contact information has been declined at this time.</p> <p>All carriers will be required to distribute paper copies of health declaration forms in flight for passengers to complete prior to arrival. The purpose of these forms is to reduce lines at entry screening and there will be no requirement on airlines to ensure completion prior to disembarkation. We will share more information once the details are known, but we anticipate that this requirement may come into effect, via the TSA Emergency Amendment process, as early as Monday 16 March.</p>	14.3.2020	Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC)
Operational Requirements	<p>CDC letter and Travelers' Health Alert Notice (T-HAN) to all airlines with direct flights from Italy and South Korea to the United States. Airlines with direct flights from Italy and Sout Korea shall distribute CDC T-HANs in flight before they reach the United States. The letter includes a script for airline crew.</p>	5.3.2020	CDC
